# Methodology


- A survey of 475 registered Maine voters in likely voter households was conducted by interactive voice response from March 17<sup>th</sup> through March 19<sup>th</sup>, 2012. Calls were made at different times of day to maximize the diversity of possible respondents. Questions were recorded by a female interviewer.
- Survey results were mathematically weighted by gender, age and geographic area to ensure an accurate representation of the population being surveyed. The sample was not weighted by party or ideology.
- □ The margin of error of this survey is 4.5%, 95 times out of 100. Sub-samples may have a larger margin of error.
- □ Frequencies and percentages may not always add up to the total number of responses or to 100%, due to weighting and rounding.
- Questions on money in politics were sponsored by Maine Citizens for Clean Elections.

MPRC is a non-partisan, non-profit organization dedicated to giving people, especially those groups that are under-represented in civic life, skills and information to participate in the decision-making processes that affect them.

# Continuing Clean Elections


Clean Election Act on the ballot and, in 1996, Maine voters passed it into law. Since 2000, qualified candidates for state office who limit their spending have received limited public funds to run for office rather than relying on campaign donations from private sources. In your opinion, how important is it that Maine continue to have Clean Elections for legislative candidates? (Asked only of supporters of continuing Clean Elections, N=329)






## Gubernatorial Clean Elections


In your opinion, how important is it that Maine continue to have Clean Elections for candidates running for Governor?

## Citizens United




# Money in Politics
